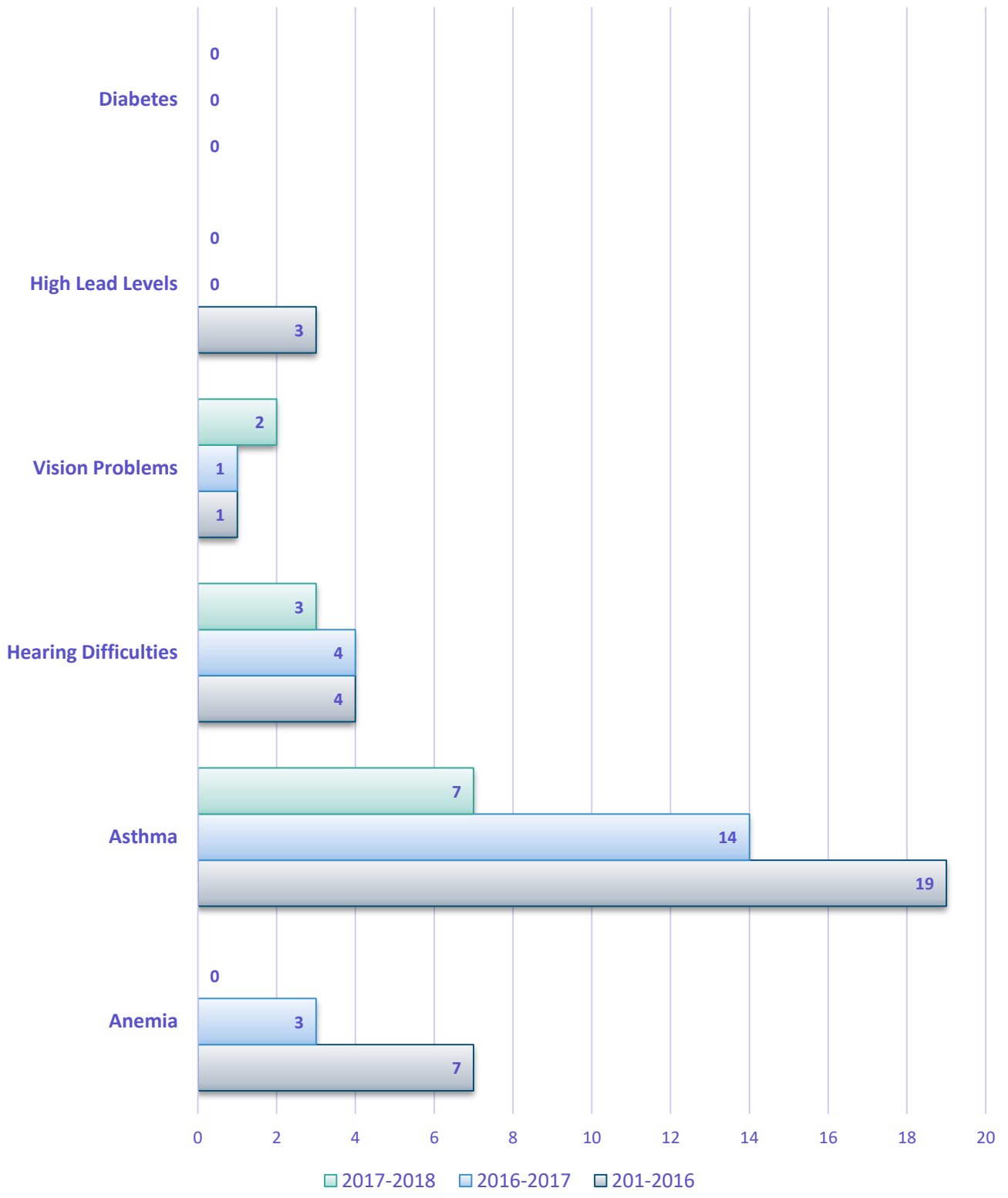

Immunizations Data

At enrollment, 225 children had up-to-date immunizations. At the end of the enrollment period, 241 children, had up-to-date immunizations. Nationally the immunization rate for children ages 19 to 35 months old in 2013 was 71.6%% and in Delaware the percentage was 74.5% according to United Health Foundation, America Health Rankings 2015.

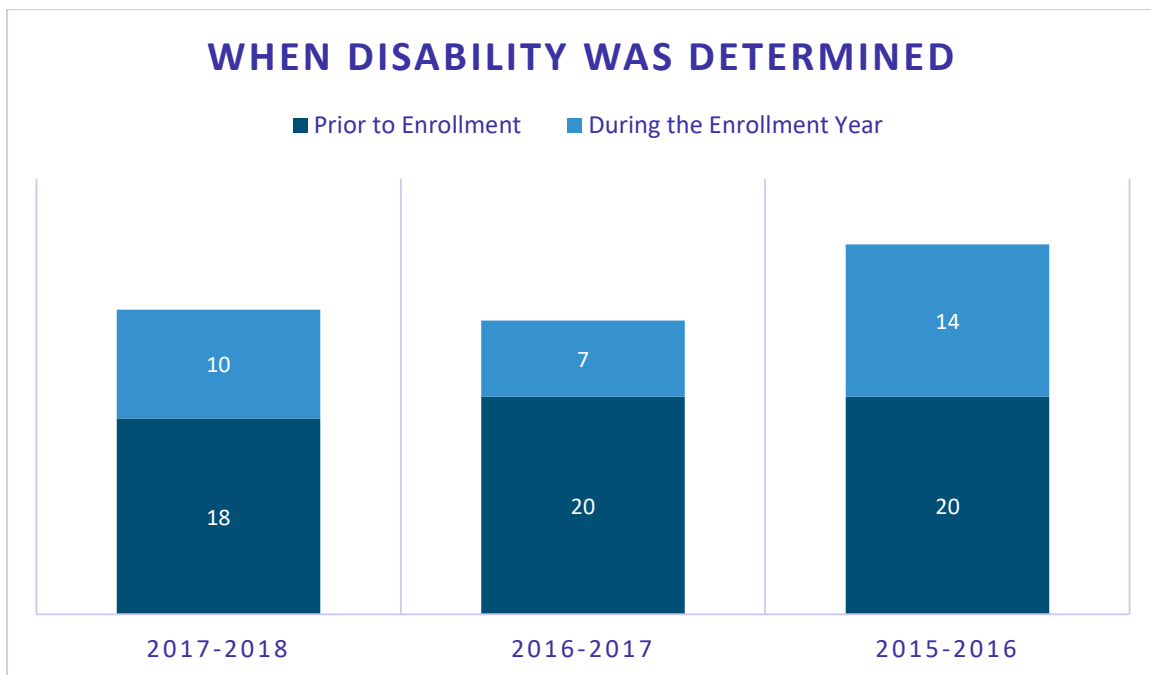
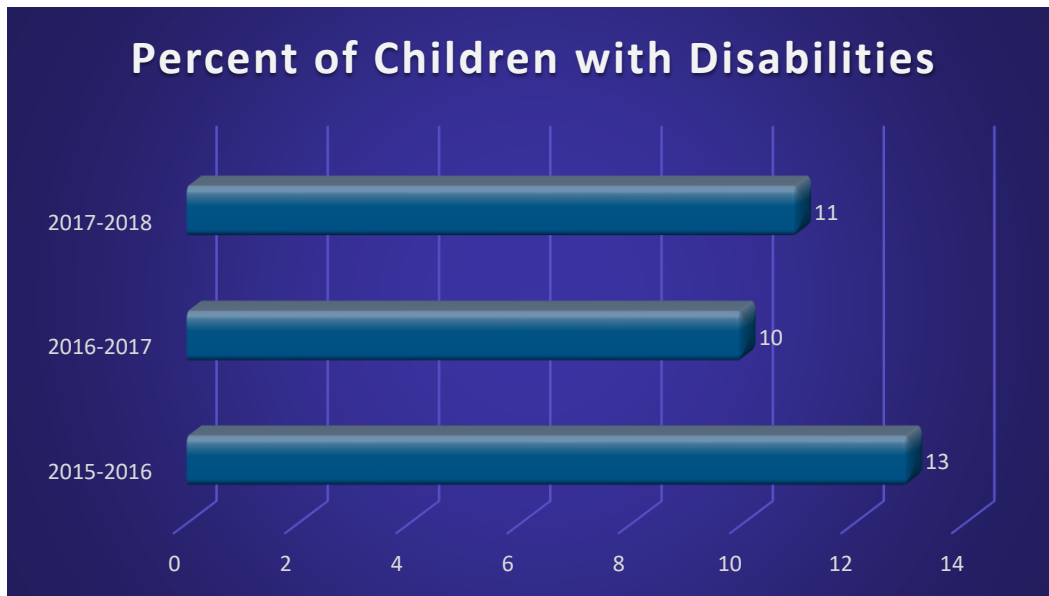

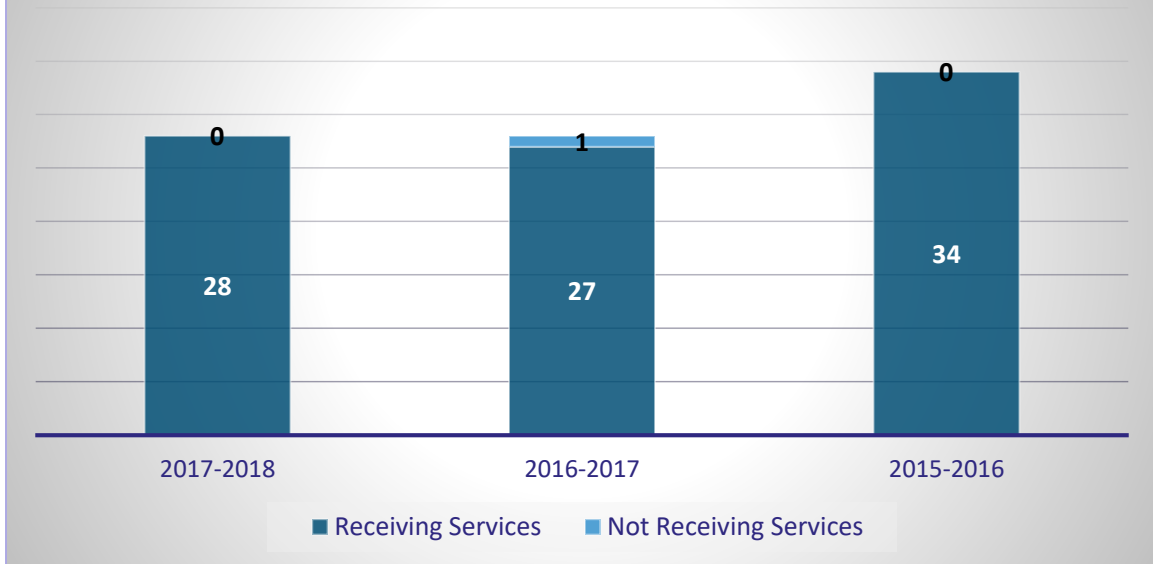


Disability Data

Eligibility for Services Through IEP or IFSP

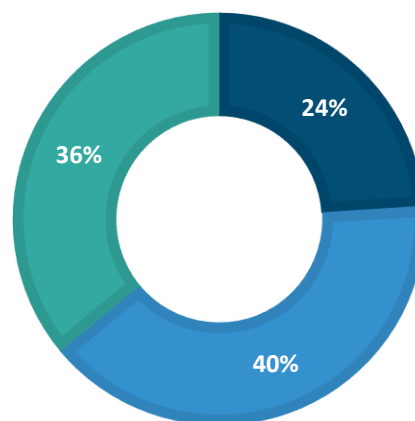


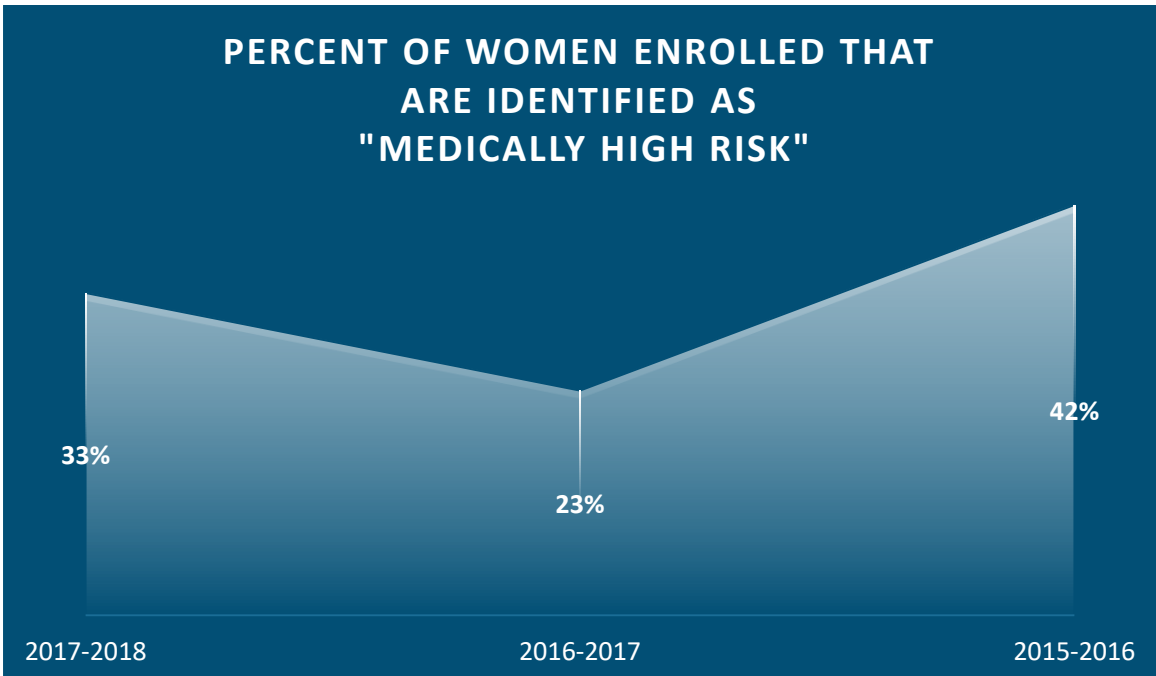
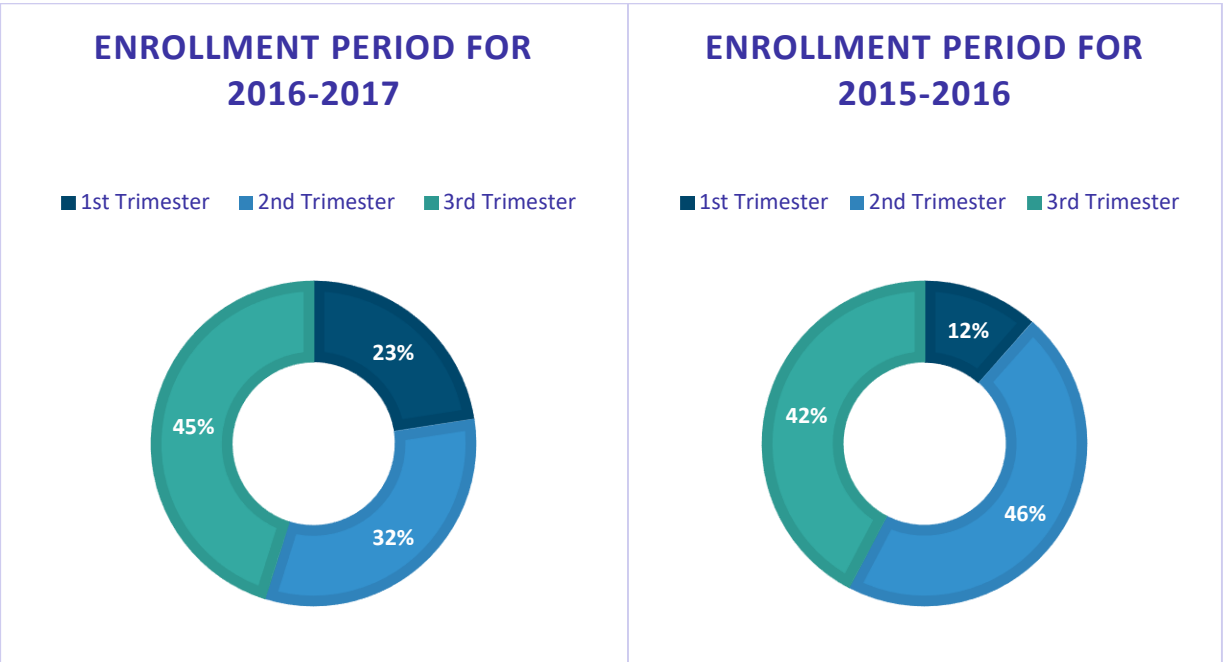

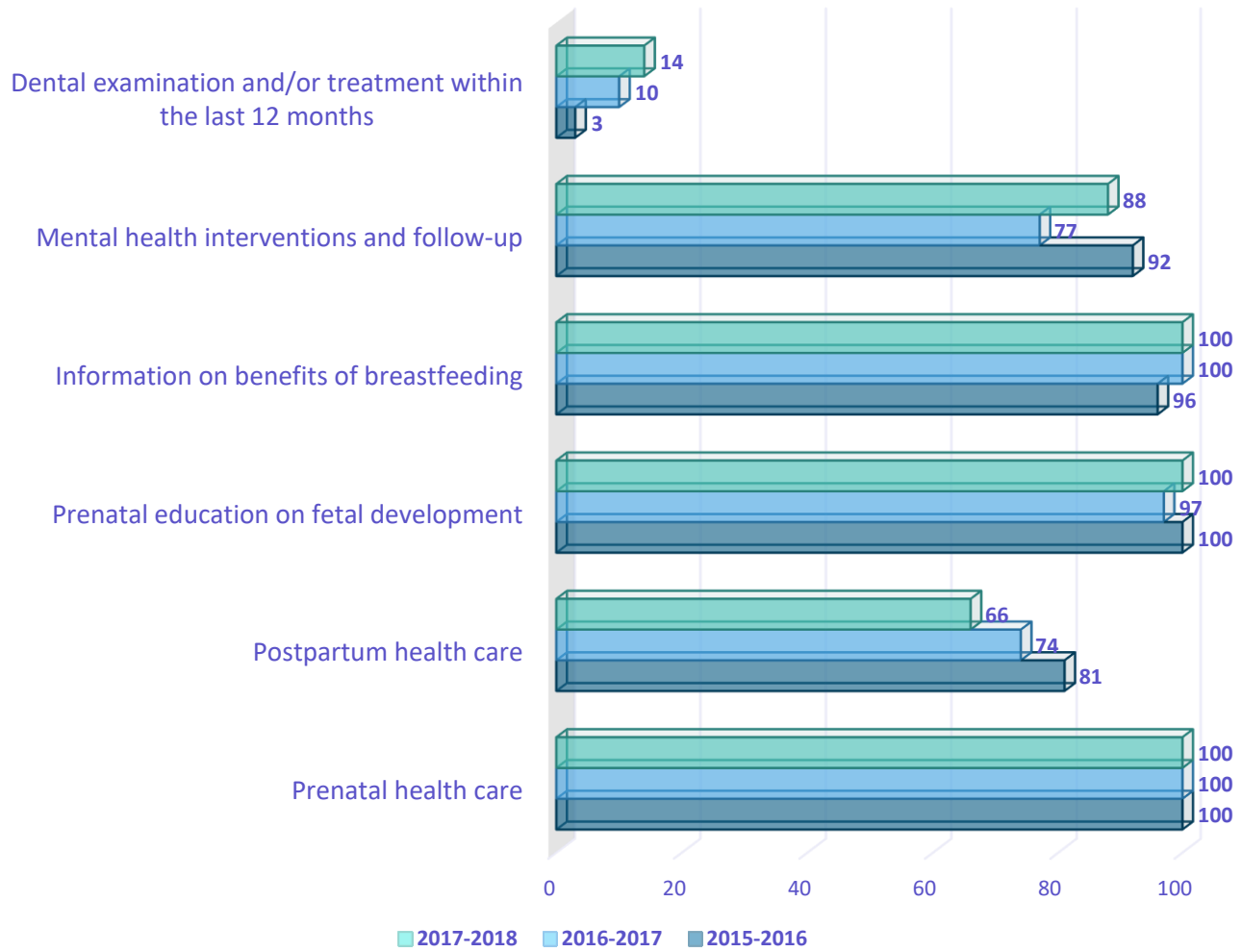
ENROLLMENT PERIOD FOR 2017-2018

■ 1st Trimester ■ 2nd Trimester ■ 3rd Trimester





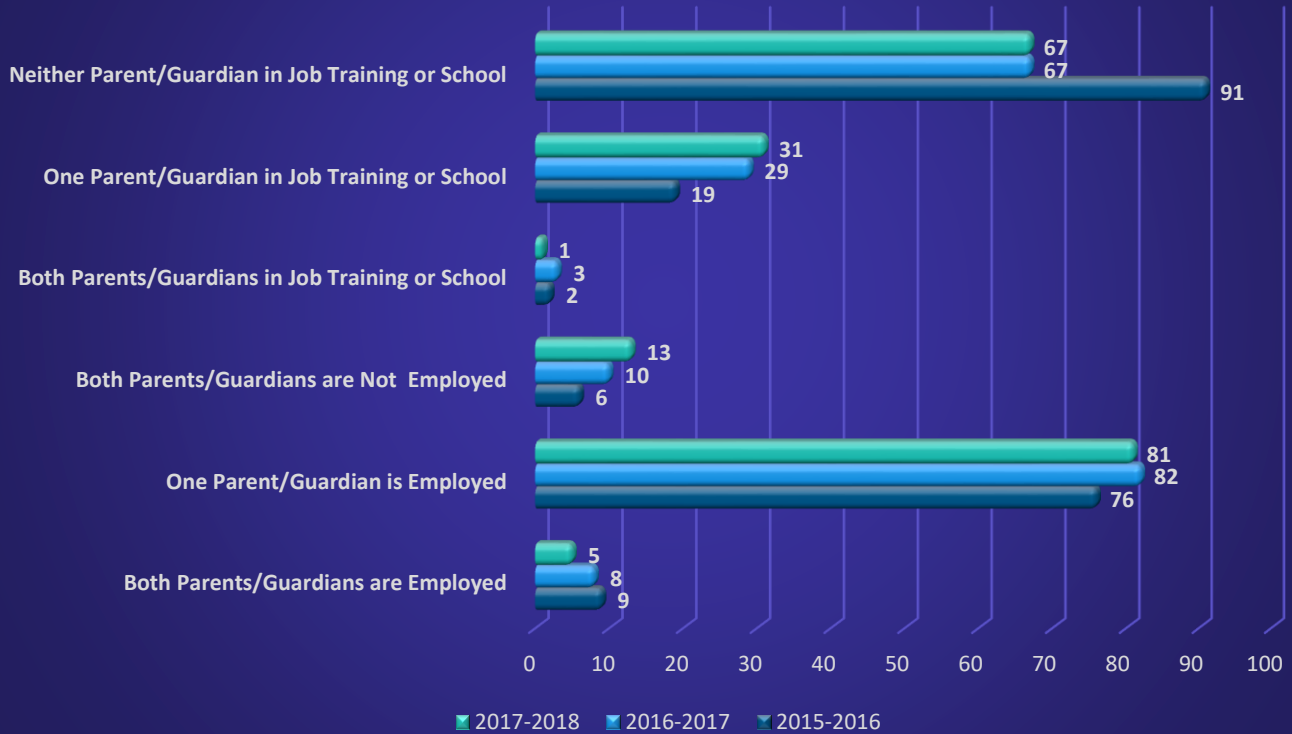
Percent of Pregnant Women Who Received Services



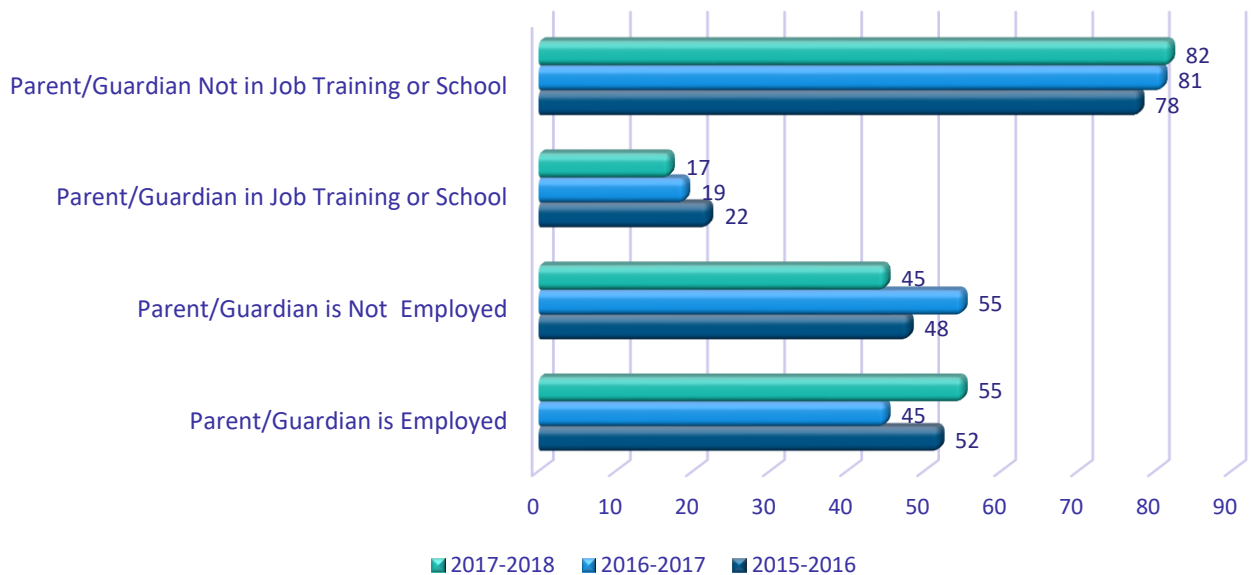

Employment Status of Two-Parent Families by Percent



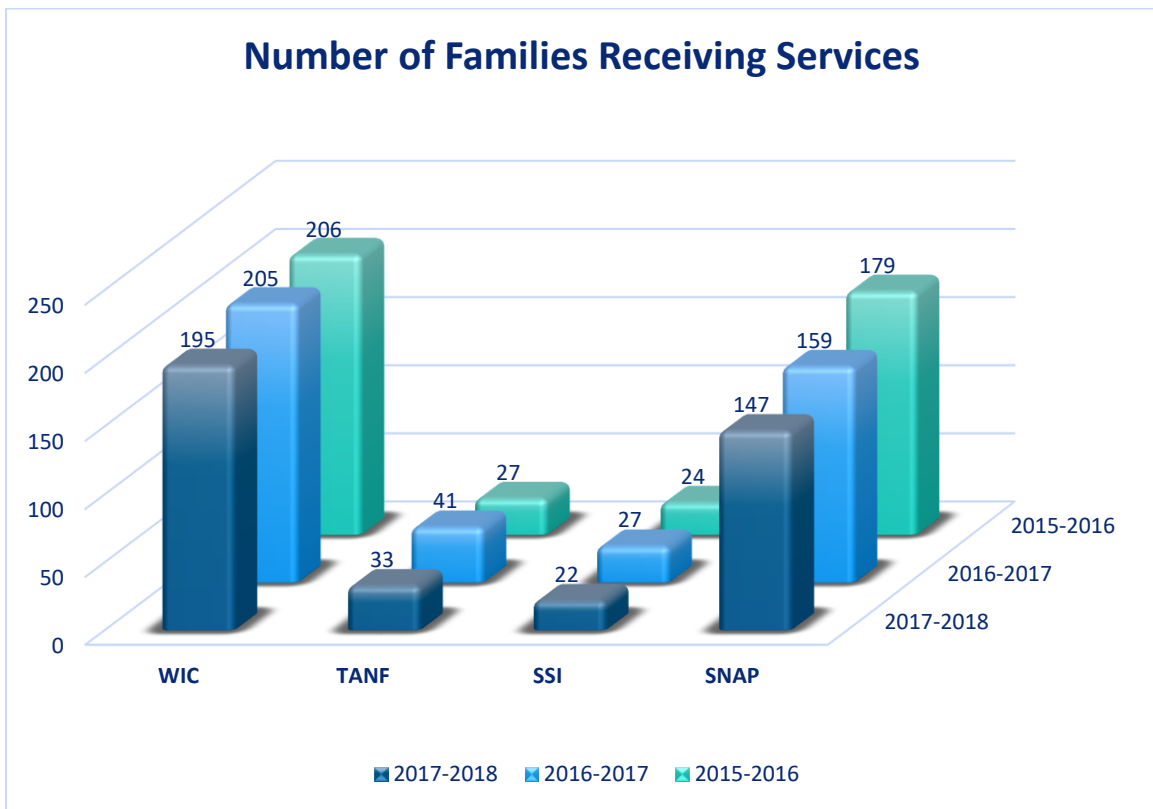
Employment Status of Single-Parent Families by Percent



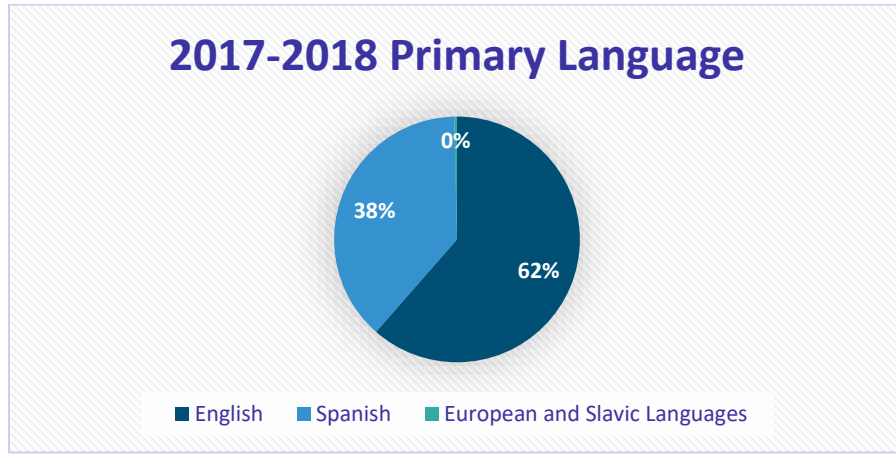

Participation in Government Assistance Data



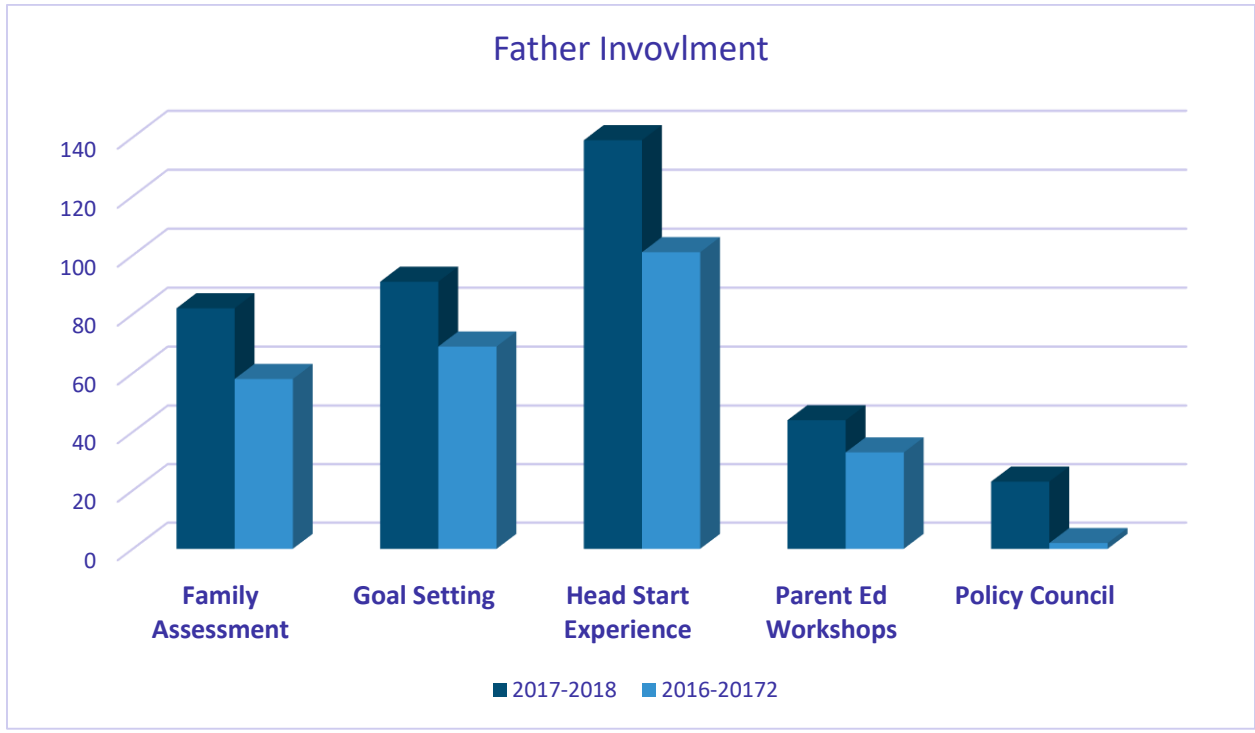

Family Partnership Process Data

Of the total number of families, 222 (100% of all families) participated in a family goal setting process. The previous program year, 100% of all families participated as well. All families received at least one family service during the program year. One hundred and one (45%) received emergency/crisis intervention (addressing an immediate need for food, clothing shelter). All 222 families received health education services and parenting education. Nineteen families (8%) received a mental health referral or assistance.





Homeless Family Data

Seven homeless families were served during the enrollment year; six homeless children were served. Five families were experiencing homelessness that acquired housing during the enrollment year.

Volunteer Information Data

The program had 187 volunteers for the enrollment year. Of these volunteers, 91 (48% of all volunteers) were former or current Head Start or Early Head Start parents.
