Enrollment Data



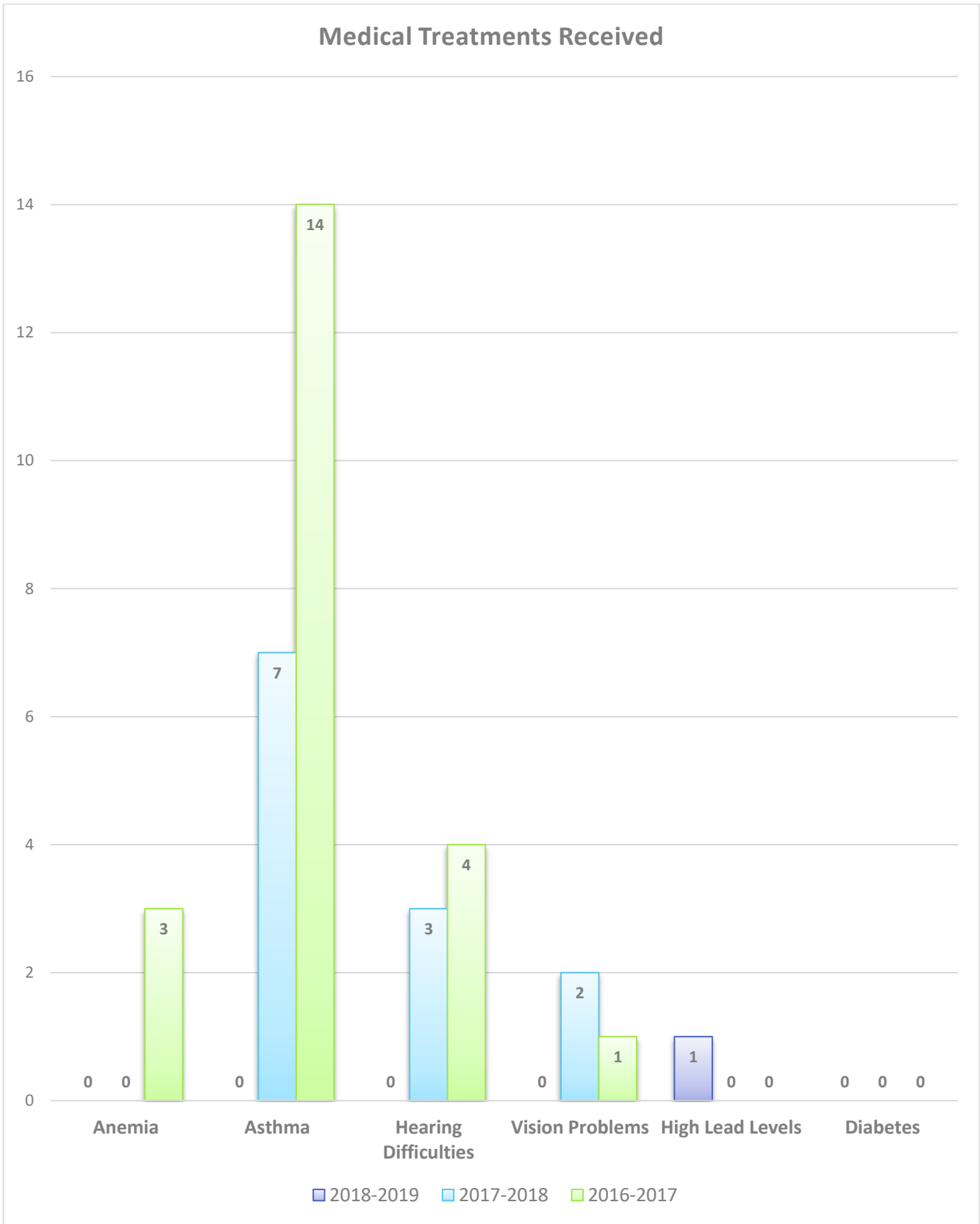

Immunizations Data

At enrollment, 221 children had up-to-date immunizations. At the end of the enrollment period, 248 children had up-to-date immunizations. Nationally, the immunization rate for children, ages 19 to 35 months old, in 2018 was 70.4% and in Delaware, the percentage was 77.1% according to United Health Foundation, America's Health Rankings 2018.

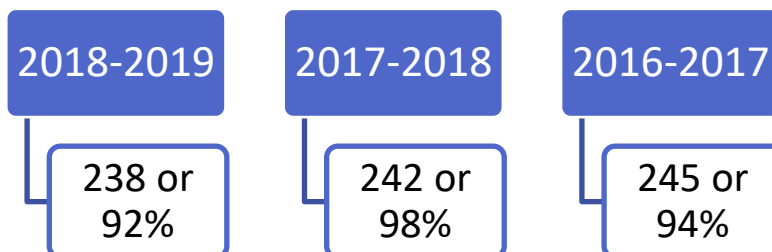

Children Up-to-Date On All Immunizations Possible at the Time But not all Appropriate for Age

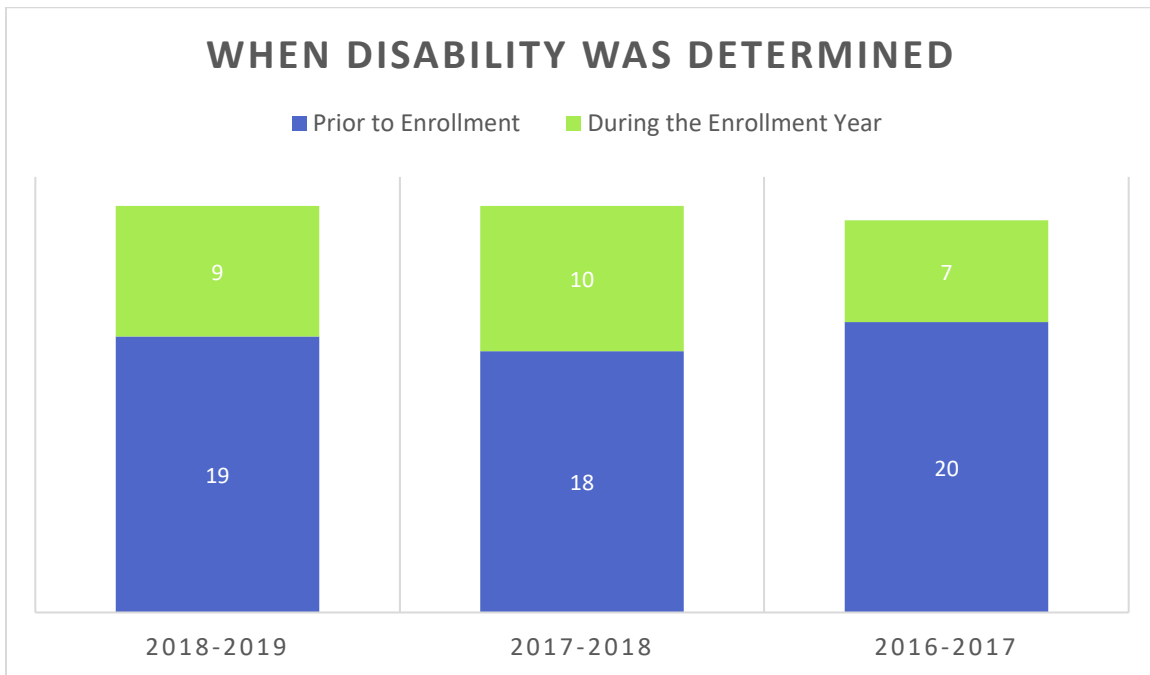
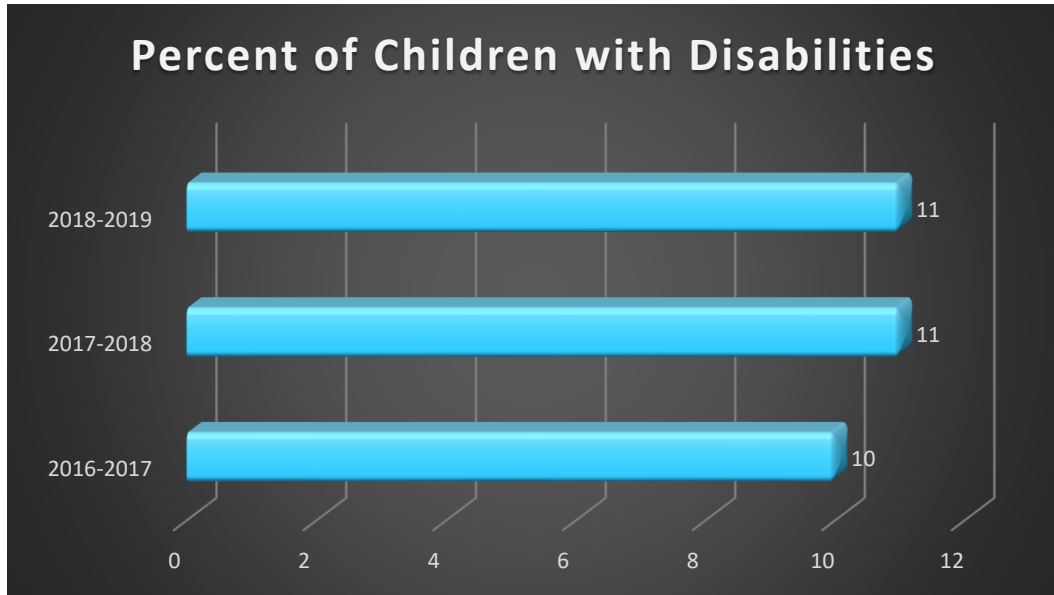

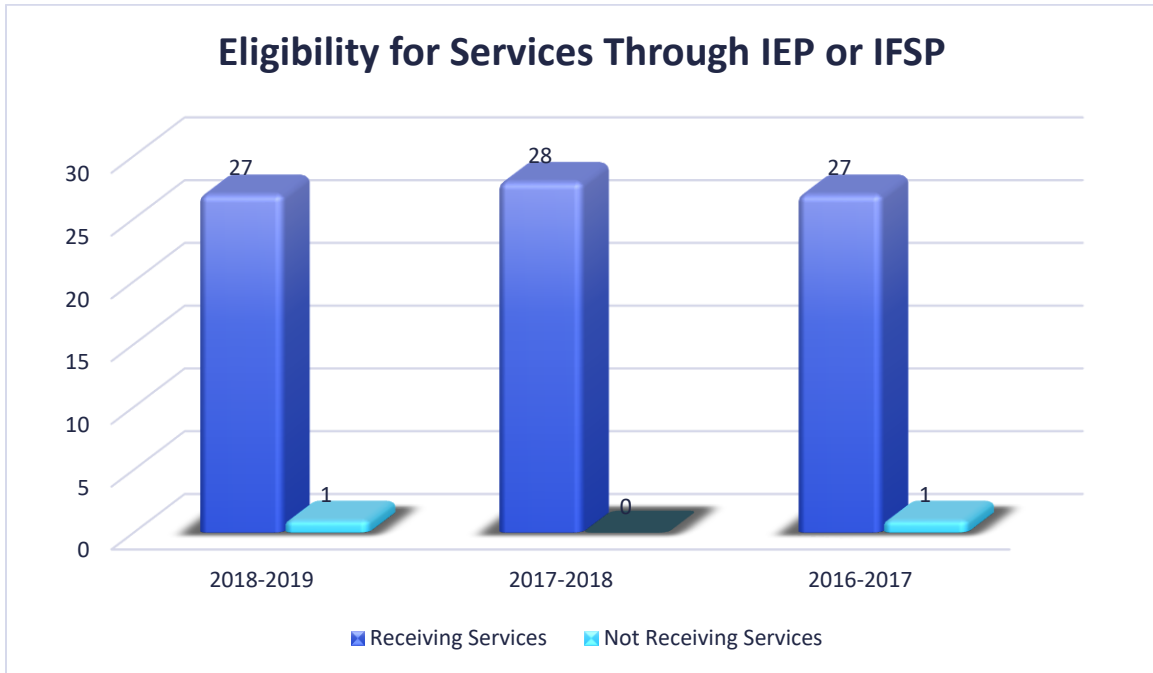

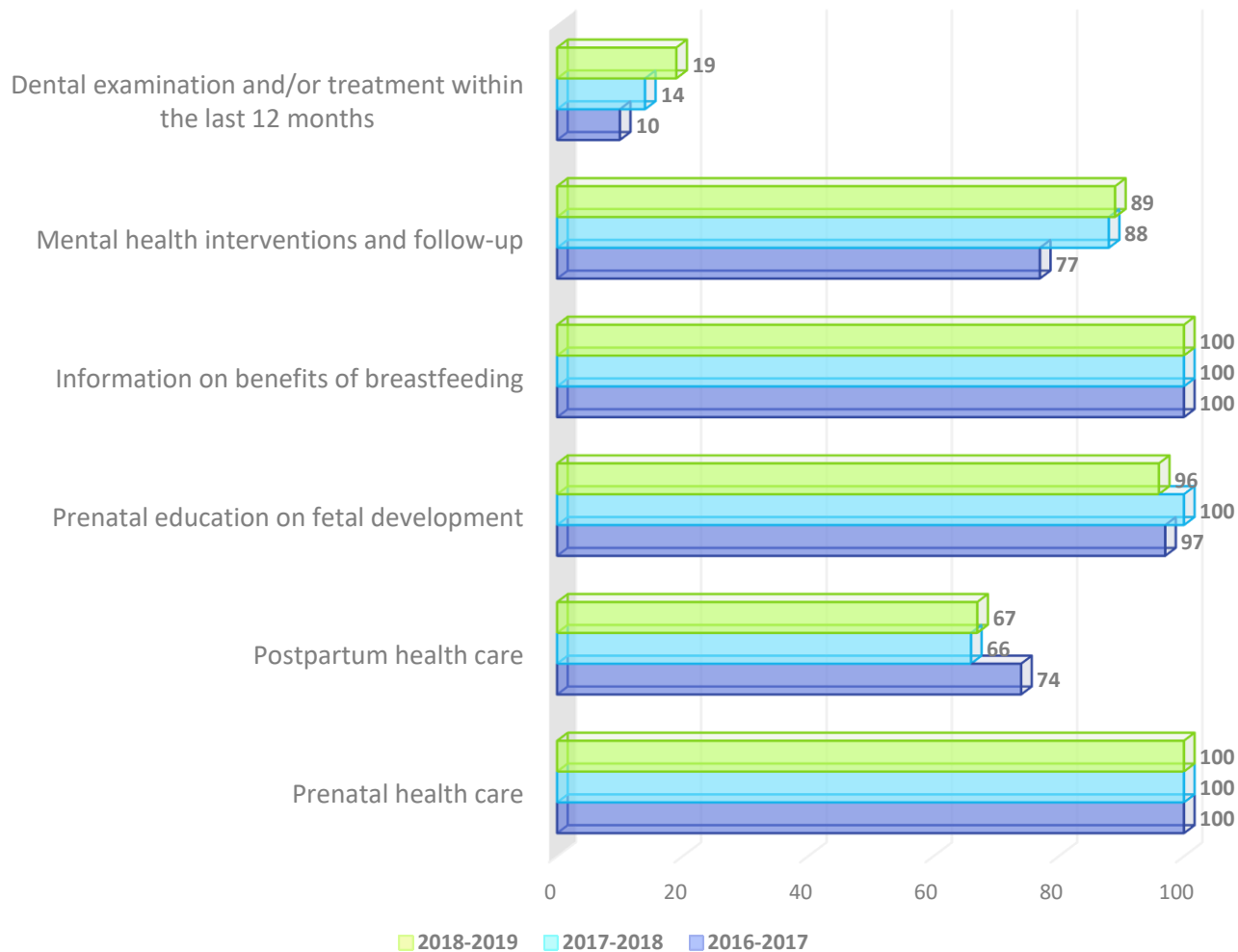

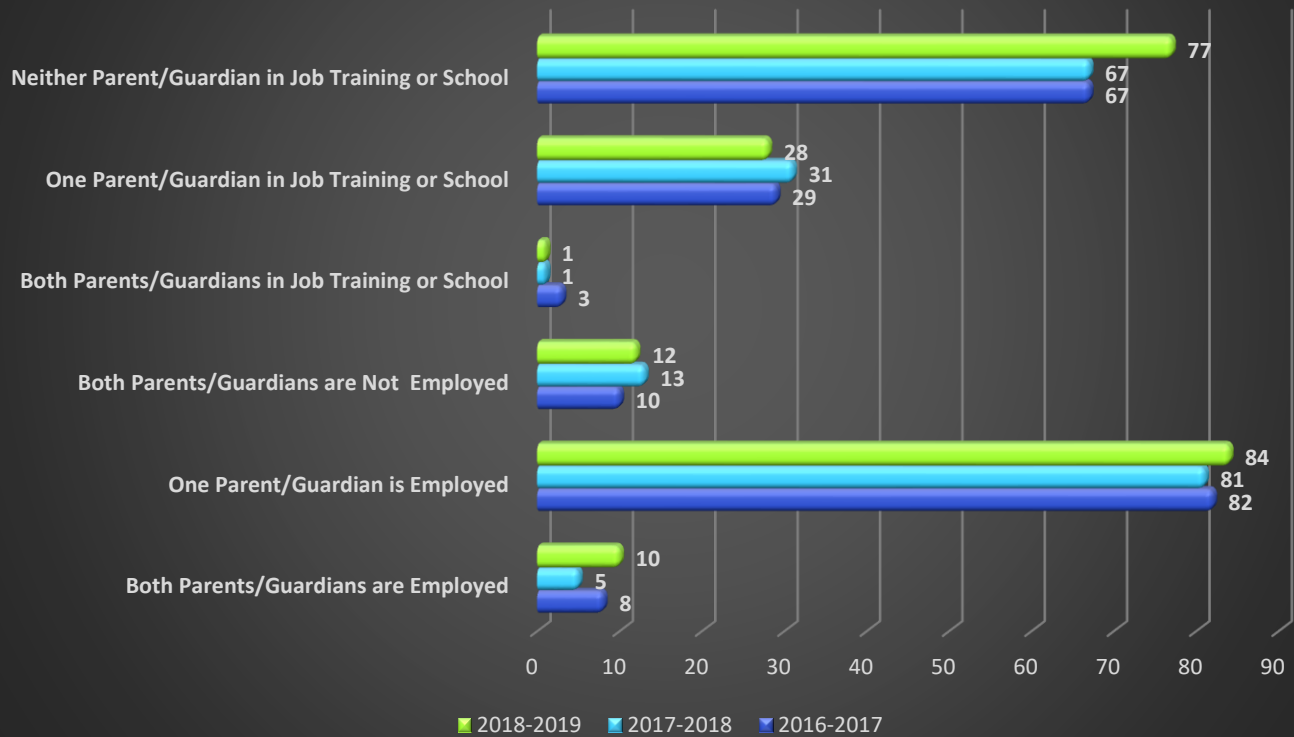
Percent of Pregnant Women Who Received Services



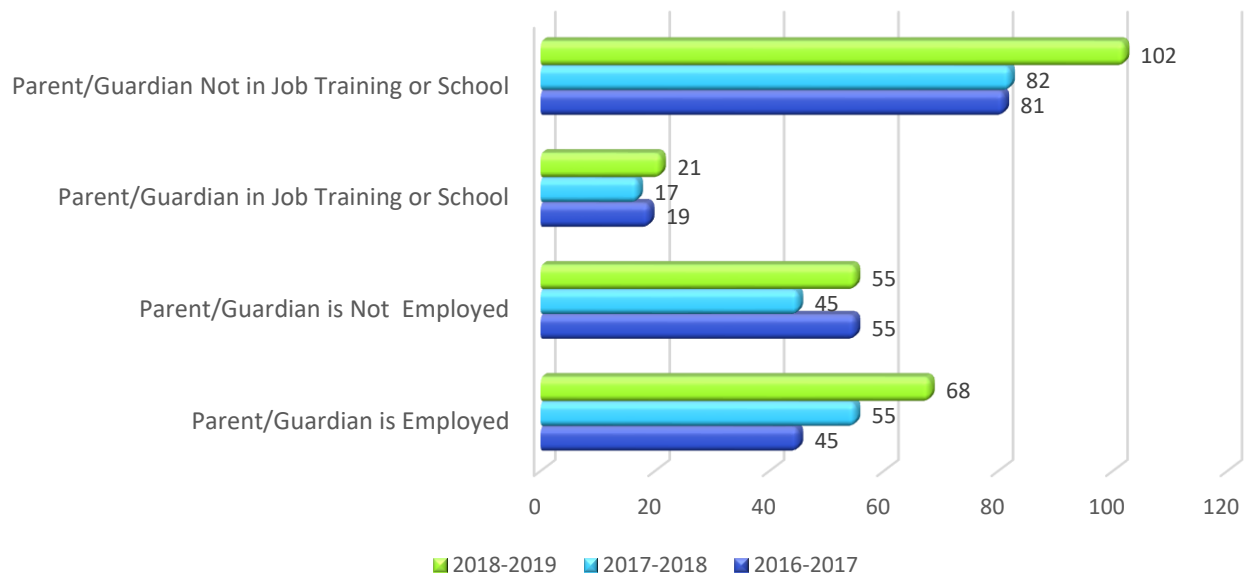

Employment Status of Two-Parent Families by Percent



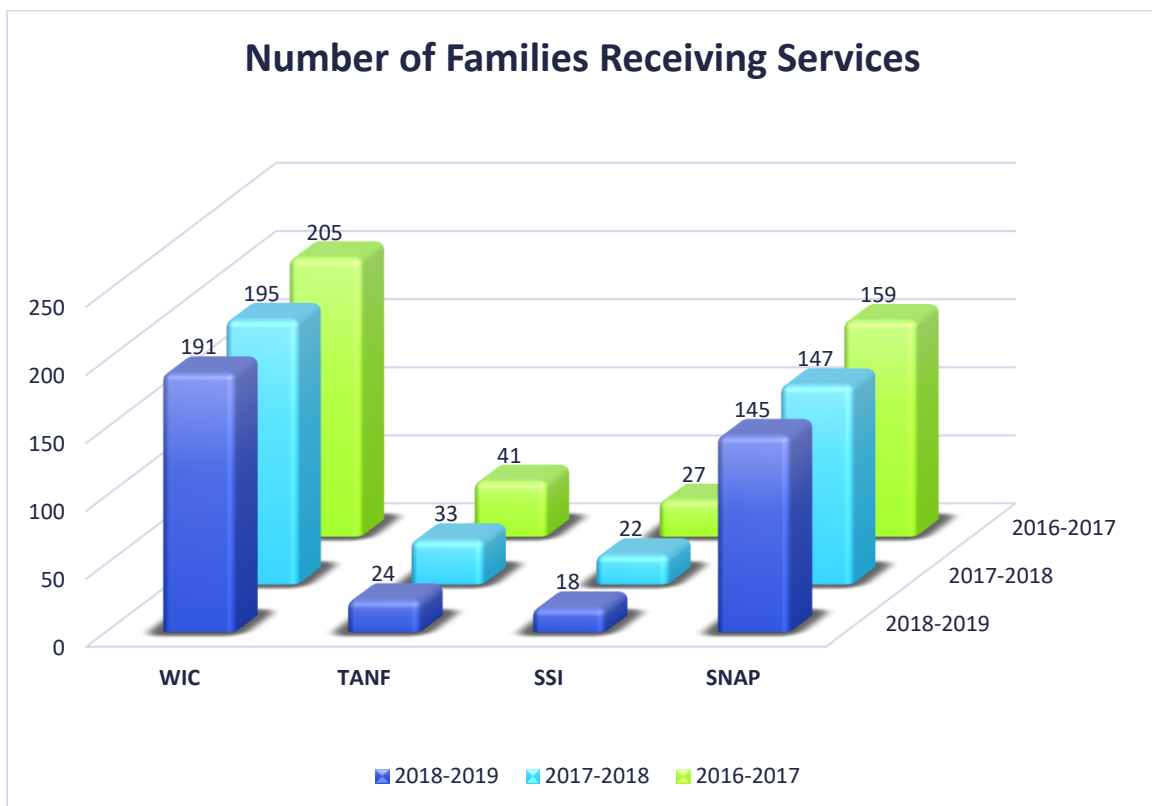
Employment Status of Single-Parent Families by Percent



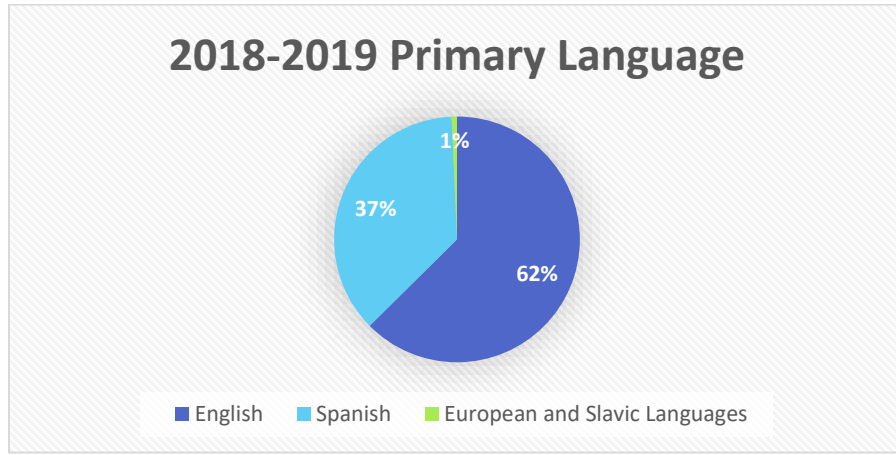

Participation in Government Assistance Data



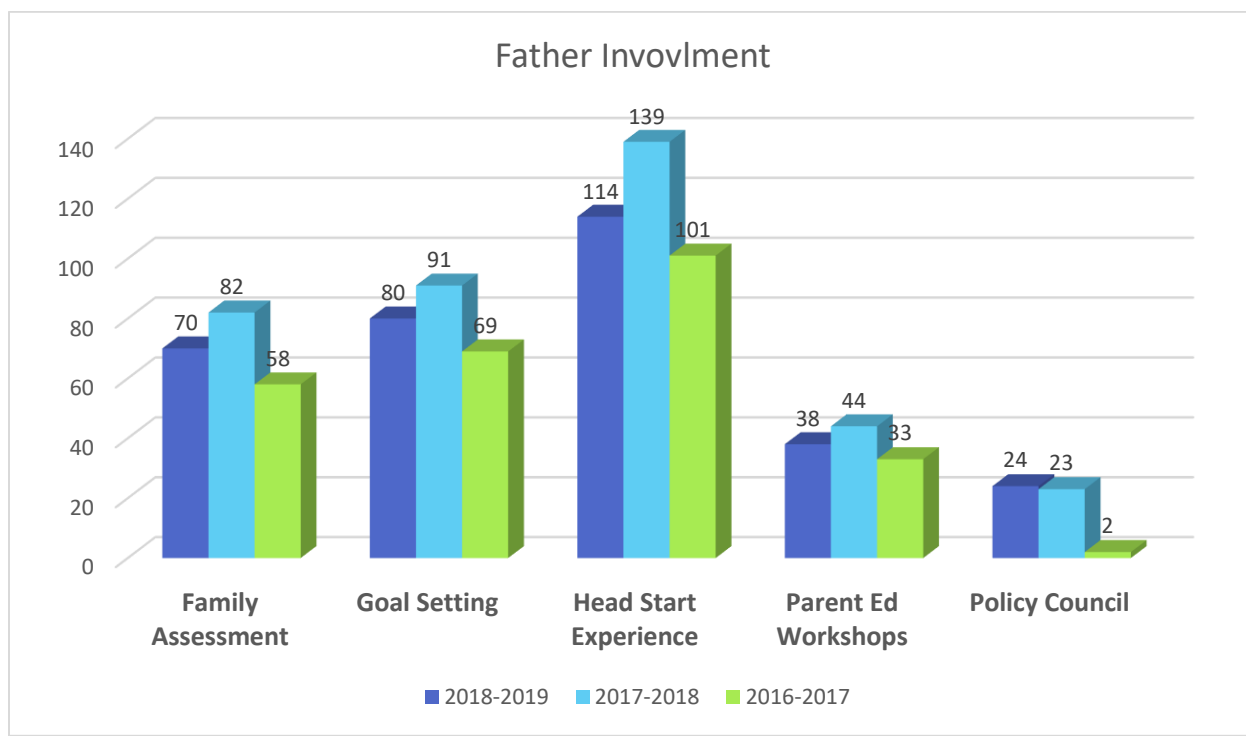

Family Partnership Process Data

Of the total number of families, 229 (100% of all families) participated in a family goal setting process. The previous program year 100% of all families participated as well. All families received at least one family service during the program year. One hundred and thirty two (58%) received emergency/crisis intervention (addressing an immediate need for food, clothing shelter). All 229 families received health education services. All but one family received parent education services. Sixty-nine families (30%) received asset-building services. Thirty-four families (15%) received a mental health referral or assistance.





Homeless Family Data

Eight homeless families were served during the enrollment year; eight homeless children were served. Three families who experienced homelessness acquired housing during the enrollment year.

Volunteer Information Data

The program had 159 volunteers for the enrollment year. Of these volunteers, 99 (62% of all volunteers) were former or current Head Start or Early Head Start parents.
